## THE MAYOR OF HELL

With all due respect to Edward G Robinson, James Cagney was the pre-eminent gangster for Warner Bros, the pre-eminent gangster film studio of the 1930s. And before the Dead End Kids, Frankie Darro was the studio's resident juvenile delinquent. It's somewhat surprising, then, that *The Mayor of Hell* is the only film in which these tough guys co-starred, but it's certainly a treat to watch them sneer at each other. The story is pretty routine: syndicate bagman (Cagney) is awarded a political job overseeing a reform school, but finds kinship with the student-inmates who

share his disadvantaged upbringing. Still, the film bristles with the kind of taut energy for which Warner Bros. was known during this period, including a rousing finale of barely controlled mayhem. Never a studio to let a good plot go to waste, Warners recycled *The Mayor of Hell* in 1938 as *Crime School*, starring Humphrey Bogart in the Cagney role and the Dead End Kids as the delinquents. Another welcome nugget from its rich pre-Code collection, the film was preserved and restored from the original camera negatives by the Library of Congress Packard Campus for Audio Visual Conservation in Culpeper, Virginia.

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
